The GEF Assembly

The GEF Assembly is the highest governing body of the GEF and is composed of all 185 member countries. It meets every four years at the ministerial level to: review general policies; review and evaluate GEF's operations based on reports submitted to Council; review the membership of the Facility; and consider, for approval by consensus, amendments to the Instrument for the Establishment of the Restructured Global Environment Facility on the basis of recommendation by the Council. It is also a great opportunity for all members to exchange political priorities, plan for, and communicate their aspirations for the long-term action of the GEF. Building on the recent momentum from UNFCCC COP27 and CBD COP15, it is an opportunity for Ministers from around the world to exchange with each other and with other stakeholders, on nature and climate priorities, including the establishment of a new Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework Fund.

Canada's vision for the GEF Assembly includes its commitment to inclusive engagement and meaningful participation of Indigenous Peoples, youth, women and girls, CSOs, communities and business leaders engaged in delivering global biodiversity and environmental benefits and building resilience to climate change. In this context, the Assembly presents an opportunity to bring together selected actors and innovators working at the grassroots level on transformative solutions for the planet and for people. Through three decades of GEF successful engagements with countries, it is apparent that, besides the moral imperative to work with non-state actors, these key stakeholders bring critical sustainability elements to GEF investments and actions at the country level. Canada also looks forward to welcoming the world to Vancouver, and showcasing examples of Canadian efforts on environmental priorities, including conservation and biodiversity protection and actions to address climate change.

New and inclusive strategies that combine conservation action with engagement of development organizations, the private sector, and civil society will be needed if we are to transform the major economic systems that are driving environmental degradation. The development of a new trust fund under the GEF, the GBF Fund, provides one example of how the public and private sectors can come together to leverage funding towards positive environmental outcomes. The cost to implement the Paris Agreement and the recently approved GBF is astronomical, reaching \$100s of billions of dollars per year. Achieving this target cannot depend on official development assistance (ODA) alone but requires collective effort from the public and private sector, including repurposing existing funding. During this plenary session, experts will present their experiences implementing strategies to unlock financing beyond simply more ODA to implement global agreements, including examples of successful re-purposing of subsidies and harmful incentives, structuring of green bonds, PES, and blended finance, highlighting innovations that are ripe for GEF engagement and future investment.
