


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Dear Friends

Head-starting programme boosts the population of Spoon-billed Sandpipers!

After the promising results of 2012, conservationists from SOS grantee Wildfow I & Wetland Trust continue with their daring intervention to save the Critically Endangered Spoon-billed Sandpiper. The team has <u>successfully hand-reared 16 fledglings</u> in 2013, which represents a valuable boost to population numbers: on average only 60 young are reared each year in the wild. These encouraging results buy the species precious time to stabilise while conservationists address the issues of illegal trapping and habitat loss along the bird's flyw ay.



Supervision missions continue with a visit in July 2013 to the Hirola project by Northern Rangelands Trust (NRT).

As the price of horn soars, more and more rhinos are at risk of slaughter by poachers, adding to local threats such as habitat loss. SOS is now supporting two projects by IRF to help save the Critically Endangered Javan and Sumatran Rhinos.



An SOS Rapid Action Grant was awarded to FREELAND Foundation to better defend the Thailand Rosew ood against the onslaught of armed poachers. Specifically, the project will enhance the safety & efficiency of enforcement operations in Thap Lan National Park.
